Chief Joseph of the Nez Perce

A Reluctant Warrior

Chief Joseph was born in 1840 in the Nez Perce homeland in the Wallowa Valley of Northeastern Oregon. The name Joseph was given to him by white men, of course, and it was originally Young Joseph, as there already was a Chief Joseph, his father. As young Joseph rose to prominence in the tribe, he came to be known as Chief Joseph, and his father as Old Joseph.

The conflict between the white settlers and the Nez Perce began and grew in much the same manner as it did in most areas of the country. The white people were few in number and more of a curiosity than a concern for the Indians at first, as there was plenty of land for everyone. But more settlers quickly followed, and before long newspaper editors were stirring the pot about all that prime real estate that was "going to waste" in the possession of "savages."

The Nez Perce would go on to sign several treaties with the government, and just like everywhere else, the first one left the Indians with everything they wanted, which they were promised they could keep for perpetuity. But perpetuity didn't last long, and the government was always able to find a reason to punish the Nez Perce by taking ever increasing chunks of their homeland.

By 1877, the Nez Perce were tired of being lied to, and in the wake of the fight at the Little Bighorn, public sympathy for the plight of Native Americans was at an alltime low. Even so, General O.O. Howard, the former Civil War hero, had developed a relationship with Chief Joseph. Old Joseph had died some years back, but not before beseeching his son to never give up the Wallowa Valley, and never sell the bones of his ancestors to the white men.


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and as such did not have sole authority to speak for his band, let alone the other bands. But Howard and others preferred to negotiate with him, as he had for years been counseling the Nez Perce to try to find a way to live with the white men. He knew there would be no end to the number of soldiers who would be sent to force his people to comply with government orders. But when told his people would have to relocate to a reservation in Idaho, Joseph flatly refused.

As he knew they would, soldiers came to round up his people and herd them to Idaho. Many of the young warriors, including Joseph's younger brother Olokott, had long disdained the idea of peace, and were ready to fight. By the time the shooting started, the Nez Perce were a divided people. Some agreed to go to the reservation, but Joseph's band decided to try to make their way to Canada as Sitting Bull's Sioux had done after the Little Bighorn. Even the young hotheads had been convinced they couldn't stand toe-to-toe with the U.S. Army and expect to prevail. But they believed they could fight their way to freedom up north.

Thus began an epic 1,500 mile, 4-month trek. Joseph and the other chiefs led 750 people across Montana, through Yellowstone, and into Wyoming toward Canada, fighting what has been described as a brilliant rear-guard action all the way. The odyssey ended in the Bear Paw Mountains of north central Montana, just forty miles from the Canadian border. There the army surrounded the Nez Perce, captured their horse herd, and killed all but two of the primary chiefs, including Joseph's brother, Olokott. *Continued on page 3*

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During the siege in the Bear Paws, the Nez Perce sent a rider to Sitting Bull, asking for help, but the Hunkpapa leader had already been told by Canadian officials that if he crossed the border, he would not be allowed to return. The Nez Perce waited in vain for help that was not coming. Ninety Nez Perce had been killed, and more fighting would only mean more dead in a lost cause. Joseph, who for the first time really was in charge, sent word to the soldiers that, "From where the sun now stands, I will fight no more, forever."

Howard recommended that Joseph's band be allowed to settle on the reservation in Idaho, but General of the Army William Tecumseh Sherman insisted they be punished, and sent them to Indian Territory. Joseph tried for the rest of his life to return his people to the Wallowa Valley. The closest they ever got was Washington state, where he died in 1904.
