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Real Life Westerners You Didn't Want to Mess With Seventh in a Series

Belle Boyd, also known as "La Belle Rebelle" was a young lady you didn't want to aggravate. She was 17 in 1861 when Union soldiers took down a Confederate flag that was flying above her Virginia home and replaced it with the stars and stripes. That was bad enough, but when one of the soldiers cursed her mother, Belle shot him dead. Though she was exonerated, the family was under virtual house arrest, with sentries posted at their home and her father's place of business.

Still angry, Belle eavesdropped on conversations between the soldiers, and charmed at least one officer into revealing military secrets. During the Shenandoah Valley Campaign in the spring of 1862, she provided valuable intelligence to Generals Turner Ashby and Stonewall Jackson, using a slave as a courier. For her contributions, Stonewall Jackson awarded her the Southern Cross of Honor and made her an honorary captain and aide-de-camp on his staff.

That summer she was betrayed and arrested, serving a month in prison before being exchanged. Her gender had stood her in good stead. While it wasn't unusual in the early days of the war for the two sides to exchange captured soldiers, a male spy would have been summarily shot. Arrested again the following year, she spent six months in prison before being released.

Suffering from typhoid, in 1864 Belle went to England to regain her health. While there she met and married, of all things, a Union naval officer. He died in 1866 when the ship he commanded went down.

Belle Boyd returned to the U.S. in 1869. A marriage, a divorce, and another marriage later, in 1886 she began touring the country giving dramatic lectures about her life as a Civil War spy. She died while on tour in Wisconsin in 1900, at the age of 56. And right up until the end, it probably wouldn't have been a good idea to say anything nasty about her mother.

Most clubs that shoot on private property are required to pay for the privilege. The Ridgecrest Gun Range Association (RGRA) is private property. Within that property, the RRV has its own dedicated range, which we have been able to develop and use as we please. And it costs us nothing. They ask only that we maintain the range, conduct our events safely and legally, and help out when we can at RGRA work parties.

There are still a few of us left who remember the days when we shot on public land. We had to haul everything in and out on the day of the match, with the worker bees arriving at the crack of dawn to start setting up—NO FUN in the dead of winter. Believe me, we are very fortunate to have a range with on-site storage and permanent shooting bays, with annual rent of \$00.00. Life is good.

The RGRA derives its income from member dues. It's \$25 a year for an individual, and \$50 for a family. Multi-year memberships are also offered, and are discounted off the annual membership cost. I don't know who in the RRV is and isn't a member of RGRA. It's none of my business. But I'm quite comfortable stating that in my opinion, every one of us should support the RGRA in any way we can.

First time shooters will be able to take their FIRST (1) NEW SHOOTERS CLASS for \$10, any subsequent new shooters class or RRV match shoot will be \$10 members, \$15 nonmembers. Donations for shooting regular monthly RRV matches will be \$10 members, \$15 non-members. Memberships run from September 1 - August 31. New memberships purchased after September will be prorated depending on the number of months remaining and the type of membership. **RRV members are encouraged to become Single Action Shooting Society (SASS) members.** Please call SASS at (505) 843-1320, or go to www.sassnet.com. SASS first year single initiation membership is \$55, renewal for single membership is \$45. As part of your SASS membership you will receive The Cowboy Chronicle (12 issues/year), registration of your alias, a SASS badge with your SASS number on it, a membership certificate and membership card, a SASS Marshall lapel pin, and SASS Shooters Handbook.
