### Cinco de Mayo Origins

As a result it flew off store shelves, and nobody could keep it in stock. The Mexican government took matters in hand, and contracted to import tons of mayonnaise from England. It was loaded into the hold of an ocean liner bound for America. After docking at New York, the ship was going to continue down the coast to Mexico to deliver the coveted condiment. Unfortunately, the ship was the Titanic, and the load of mayonnaise went to the bottom along with everything else. Mexican citizens were so distraught that they set aside a day every year as the occasion for everybody to get drunk and mourn the time the mayonnaise sunk, or, Sinko de Mayo.

OK, OK, try this one. Mexico has never won a war, so it is reduced to calling for a holiday to celebrate their victory over the French army in an obscure battle, the results of which were quickly reversed by the French. as most other American groups had never even heard of it. But then those Texas distributors launched a Cinco de Mayo-themed ad encouraging Mexican Americans already celebrating the holiday to make it a priority on that day to drink Mexican beer. The campaign took off nationwide, and the rest is history.

What occurred in only eight short years was the holiday solidifying itself as a time to drink Corona beer. By 1996, consuming Corona as a way to celebrate Cinco de Mayo was the core way most people acknowledged the holiday's existence, a huge victory for the Corona marketers. That year marketing manager Don Mann bragged, "Corona is the first thing that comes to mind when customers think Cinco de Mayo."

As the holiday has grown in popularity, its connection to the original meaning has continued to weaken, while its excuse to party has drastically increased. Much of this has to do not only with the adept marketing of companies like Corona – who spend \$1 on Cinco de Mayo promotions for every case of beer sold – but also the time of year in which the holiday falls. Early May signifies the true start of spring in most of America, just as the weather is turning balmy, and with Memorial Day almost four weeks away, many Americans are looking for any excuse to be outside celebrating in the sunshine. Americans spend as much as \$500 million more on a holiday weekend than on a normal weekend, so making a big deal out of Cinco de Mayo is good for business. Add that to the fact that most Americans associate Mexican food with warm weather, and you've got the perfect combination for an epic party. And, uh, don't forget the mayonnaise.
