### Don't Get Brassy with Me!

Today (November 21, 2016) I ordered 1,000 pieces of new .45 Colt unprimed brass. There's nothing unusual about that, except that it is the first time I ever bought .45 Colt brass.

When I started this game 20 years ago I bought eight boxes of Remington .45's for \$17.00 a box, which I thought was awful. And of course, it was, in 1995. But now we know what awful really is. Anyway, I had judiciously researched that ammunition and found it propelled a 250 grain bullet from a 7 - 1/2 inch test barrel at 960 f.p.s. Since the SASS maximum was 1,000 f.p.s., I figured I was golden. *Little* did I know, but that's another article. ☺

I subsequently bought a box or two of new ammo here or there, and bought several hundred reloaded rounds from Ten-X, which he made from used brass collected and auctioned off by the Boy Scouts at End of Trail. At that point I started sending my brass to Ten-X to be reloaded. My shooting buddy, Gimpy Gus, and I decided we needed to roll our own, so we went halves on a Dillon Square Deal B, which I still use today.

I have been reloading that collection of brass ever since. Conservatively speaking, I have put 30,000 .45 Colt rounds downrange in the last 20 years. I know it sounds crazy, but non-conservatively speaking, it's probably closer to 40,000. I never owned more than 1,500 pieces of brass; most likely, less than that. So I've reloaded that brass I started with 20 times, maybe more.

I guess I planned to shoot it forever, although I've culled a lot of split cases. Splits starting at the mouth and working their way down are the most common failure of worn out brass. I catch them




at every step in the process: sorting, cleaning, lubing, reloading, boxing, loading table, and unloading table. But I missed one when I was reloading the cartridges I used on November 19<sup>th</sup>.

If I had put it in a pistol, everything would have been hunky-dory. It would have been a little hard to punch out of the cylinder at the unloading table, but no big deal. I've caught a lot of splits at that point. But I didn't put it in a pistol, I put it in my rifle. It was number 4 or 5 in a ten shot string. With every shot, the split got a little deeper, and the bullet sank a little farther into the case. But the time it got to the receiver, it was flush with the mouth of the case. My rifle didn't understand, and tried to let another cartridge into the receiver. The carrier came up under that one part way out of the magazine, and at that point, things locked up good and tight. I'm glad that compressed powder load didn't make it all the way to the chamber. It might have just kicked a little hard, or it might have been a bomb. I can live without knowing.

I had just put my Marlin back into service. It had developed "Marlin Jam-itis," that little groove in the carrier that lets the carrier drop down too low, and in the process of looking into that, I must have lost the spring-loaded plunger and retainer clip from the carrier. Anyway, it was missing. I welded the groove, ordered the parts, and it worked like a charm, until the 19<sup>th</sup>. I was afraid my gunsmithing had come undone, but it was that bad case that did it.

The moral of the story is that nothing lasts forever, not even thick, resilient, .45 Colt brass. But you can count on your fellow cowboy shooters. Venomous Doc loaned me his rifle and gave me ammo to shoot the last stage. Thanks, Doc.
